If you've been following #lakeviewbarnstorming on social media, you know that with the help of some dedicated volunteers, we recently dismantled two 1900's-era barns, beam by beam, joist by joist. These structures have yielded an amazing supply of timber beams, wooden siding, and lumber for the restoration of our pre-Civil War-era lodge at Lakeview Springs.

Under the direction of Old Man Bailey, our restoration specialist, we were able to guide the more than a dozen volunteers who helped at various points in the projects through the careful and sometimes painstaking process of reclaiming all of this salvaged material. The crews worked tirelessly on various work days from March 7 – 30, clearing out clutter, removing tin roofs, and literally pounding out every nail in preparation for our upcoming restoration project this summer.

Our Facebook page has a series of videos documenting the project from start to finish that you can check out. Many thanks to everyone who braved high winds, snow, and rain to help with this project! And special thanks to Old Man Bailey for his careful coordination of the work process, schedule, and crews.

HOW VOLUNTEERS HELP US CHANGE THE LAKEVIEW LANDSCAPE—AND MORE THAN DOUBLE OUR REACH!

It's no exaggeration to say that Lakeview couldn't exist in its current state without a small army of volunteers. Whether it's big projects—such as building or remodeling cabins, forging new mountain bike paths, and pouring concrete for our Amphitheater—or routine maintenance roles, such as picking up a paintbrush, cleaning out a cabin, or spreading mulch, our volunteers have done it all!

And while a group of willing workers might not accomplish what a professional could undertake, Lakeview volunteers do make a significant difference in the workload for our staff. "In hard dollars," said John, "it's easy to figure out the value of our volunteers."

Say that 75 people show up for Work Weekend and provide 4-6 hours of steady work. That's the equivalent of over 40 days of work getting camp ready for summer! "Without those volunteers," said John, "we would have to hire at least three staff people to do that work. In that sense, our volunteers are absolutely necessary."

But there's a spiritual value volunteers bring to Lakeview as well. "We focus on God's gifts and the impact our work has on people who come to



Q & A WITH DAN KIEL LAKEVIEW'S LONGEST-SERVING VOLUNTEER



Meet Dan Kiel, longtime Lakeview volunteer and inspiration for the "Dan Kiel Award," given every year to a Lakeview Ministries volunteer who goes above and beyond in service to our ministry. We thought it was time to reveal the man behind the award.

HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN SERVING AT CAMP?

DK: Since the mid-1990s. I had worked for 30 years at Cummins, and when they offered a generous retirement package to some of us in 1988, I took it. I remember thinking that I needed to find a way to thank the Lord for letting me retire so well when I was only 50 years old. My kids had gone to Camp Lakeview, and a friend of mine was serving on the board. He was looking for a replacement, and I decided it was a good fit.

After serving on the board for seven years, I served on the foundation board for another five years. When I was on the foundation, I started coming once a week to volunteer at camp. At the end of my term, I thought, "Now what am I going to do?" I realized that I was already working at camp, so why couldn't I just keep doing that?

WHAT DO YOU LIKE BEST ABOUT VOLUNTEERING AT LAKEVIEW?

DK: I like that there's always something to do: cutting down trees, mopping floors, setting up tables, clearing trails—whatever is needed. I never know until I get there.

REFLECTIONS ON THE POWER OF A PERSONAL CONNECTION

HOW DAN KIEL HELPED ME FORGE A NEW PATH BY DAVID VAMDERCAR, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

My first interaction with Dan Kiel was when I was on Summer Staff over twenty years ago. I was a college kid assisting in maintenance, and I met this guy who came out every week to volunteer. Dan quickly became the icon of camp to me. I had no way of knowing at the time, but he was to have a tremendous impact on my life. Of course, as a college student, it never occurred to me that one day I would be the Executive Director of Camp!

When the job came available in 2013, I was working as the Site Manager for Camp Lakeview. I remember telling my wife that I would be interested in being the Executive Director...someday.



Dan was the first one to come up to me and say, "Are you going to submit your resume?"
That question completely set me back on my heels.
"What do you see in me? Am I actually qualified for that?" were the first questions that came to my mind.

The respect I had for Dan and the friendship I had built with him made me rethink my timetable. I knew Dan loved camp. The fact that he would think of me as a good fit for the Executive Director position opened the door for God to work in my heart and say, "It doesn't matter who you are or whether or not you think you are qualified. If I am calling you to that position, I will make you sufficient."

who was reluctant to come to camp. When we went to pick her up, she didn't want to leave! That tells you the kids are having a good experience, and it's not just the fun things. The experiences kids have at camp often change the direction of their lives. Some choose to pursue full-time ministry. Others become teachers or counselors. I've seen marriages form here. It's just a Christ-centered place.

WHAT ARE SOME OF YOUR FAVORITE PROJECTS AT LAKEVIEW?

DK: We've done so many things. Shortly after I joined the board, we built three new cabins, then a new dining hall and shower house. We've done all kinds of projects: the Welcome Center, the shop, the barn, all the development at Lakeview Villages, even purchasing the property at The Springs.

It's been a fantastic time for me to see how camp has grown. When I first joined the board, there were just eight cabins and the chapel. We had 600 kids that came in the summer. We now serve 2,400 kids in the summer and 10,000 adults throughout the year. There were 15 buildings when I started volunteering. Now we have 55. How can you explain that growth without the Lord's help?

WHAT WOULD YOU SAY TO SOMEONE WHO IS THINKING ABOUT VOLUNTEERING AT CAMP?

DK: After I get through trying to convince them, they need to offer prayers and ask God what they should be doing. There's a real fellowship of working together. The staff is friendly, gracious, and willing to help. When I go out there on Fridays, we always have a noon meal together. They have fun amongst themselves and enjoy great conversations. It's something you have to experience for yourself.

YOU TURNED 85 THIS YEAR. HOW LONG DO YOU THINK YOU'LL KEEP VOLUNTEERING AT LAKEVIEW?

DK: Until I can't get out there anymore or until they take away my keys.
