HOW STABILITY IN STAFFING STRENGTHENS LAKEVIEW

Here at Lakeview Ministries, God has blessed us with something really special—our staff. We always say that our staff is the heart and soul of our ministry. Whether it's our junior staff, summer staff, or the folks who work this job year-round, God has brought us some pretty amazing people.

The leadership at Lakeview has made staff retention a priority. Unlike the industry standard, where program directors usually burn out and leave an organization after 3 – 5 years, our team of directors has racked up a combined 60-plus years of service!

That's something to celebrate! Stability in our staffing means we can build relationships with our campers that extend year over year. It also means we can invest in trainings and certifications for our staff, such as EMT and lifeguard instructor training and certifications in high ropes course management, that strengthen our value as an organization.

Our hope is that this kind of investment in our team sends a message loud and clear that we love them and value them as individuals as well.

Over the last 5 years at camp, a big focus has been on creating better practices and policies to allow our staff a sustainable work-life balance, even in the midst of the intensity of summer and other high-stress times at camp. We've also expanded our year-round staff team to meet

the workload demands of this growing ministry.

"We make this investment," said

HOW LAKEVIEW JOINS FORCES WITH THE LCMS DISTRICT OFFICE TO STRENGTHEN GOD'S KINGDOM

A key piece of Lakeview's foundation is the strong partnership we enjoy with the Indiana LCMS District and Lutheran churches within our area. We are truly blessed in how much our District and churches view camp as a resource.

For instance, Lakeview has been privileged to host Dr. Richard Stuckwisch, LCMS Indiana District President, while he's been traveling in our area. "To me," said David Vandercar, executive director, "that just shows his willingness and support of what we're doing."

Dr. Stuckwisch agrees. "Lakeview provides a nice setting for our people to gather for conferences and retreats," he said. "It's a wonderful partnership to work with people who share the same Confession."

As part of that partnership, Lakeview hosts several district events at camp each year, including the Indiana District Youth Rally (for middle school students), the Indiana District Youth Gathering (for high school students), and the Southern Region Pastor's Conference (for pastors in the southern half of the Indiana District). In addition, dozens of Lutheran churches and schools bring groups out to camp each year, ranging from Outdoor Education to confirmation groups and youth group retreats.

Ephesians 4:16 says "From [Christ] the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work." This description of the body of Christ beautifully captures the way that the ministry of camp and the ministry of the church intertwine.

"We aren't trying to do church at camp," said David Vandercar, executive director. "We do camp at camp." The unique aspects of camp ministry, where people can come to retreat, rest, and form temporary community, lead to incredible opportunities for change and growth. In that way, camp can deliver a huge boost to the year-round ministry churches already are doing.

The love and support shown to camp by the District and our Lutheran churches and schools is a privilege we do not take lightly, and we pray that camp continues to be a place where people of the church can go to be supported and encouraged in return. To God be the glory!

AWARDED GRANTS PAVE WAY FOR EXPANDED MINISTRY

In the last six months, Lakeview Ministries (South Central Lutheran Camp Association of Indiana) was awarded not one but TWO significant grants to further its ministry. This past spring, the Harrison County Community Foundation (HCCF) awarded a \$70,000 grant to fund the ongoing restoration and installation of modern utilities for our Civil-War era lodge at the Springs.

"The lodge, once restored, is going to serve as the epicenter for any guests arriving at the Springs and is a significant step toward the ultimate goal of allowing the Springs to provide family-focused retreats for all ages of our community.

"We are so thankful to the Harrison County Community Foundation for this generous contribution to our work at the Springs," said David Vandercar, Executive Director. "We are humbled that they would choose to invest in our ministry efforts at the Springs, and we are thrilled to be able to bring this project to completion."

In addition to the HCCF grant, Lakeview Ministries was recently awarded a **\$647,750** grant from Lilly Endowment Inc. to help further the mission and ministry of camp. This grant was funded through Lilly Endowment's "Strengthening Youth Programs in Indiana" initiative. Out of all the camps awarded grants across the US, Lakeview received the highest total awarded!

This grant will allow for several important projects to be completed in the next two years at camp. The most significant will be building a 6th village cluster at Lakeview Villages, completing our goal of building six village clusters and allowing 120 campers to come to the Villages each week of the summer. In addition, we will be improving accessibility at the village clusters, paving the gravel road and parking area that runs through the Villages and increasing trail lighting across the site.



FOUNDATIONS FOR

This grant is a huge building block as we look at the next 10 years for Lakeview Ministries and begin preparing to launch our next capital campaign.

There is always more to do at camp, and the ability to fund and complete all these necessary projects in the immediate future is a huge help in allowing us to focus on other needed projects long term. We are excited for what the future holds here at camp!

"Organizations outside Lakeview are noticing the work we are doing to strengthen Indiana's youth,"

said David Vandercar. "We were able to show how we've been good stewards of past grants and individual donations. The fact that the Lilly Endowment is willing to invest in Lakeview validates that investment and sends a strong statement that they want to see us grow."

Look for the completion of the Lakeview Springs lodge this summer and a 6th village cluster at camp in the summer of 2025!
